

## NOVEMBER IN ENGLAND Pub Night November 01/95

(The following is some of the history of Hallowe'en. This was to have been printed prior to the November Pub nite in Veraquilon, but due to a mix up on the Editor's part, it was omitted. The information is still relavant, so here goes:)

The Groaning Board invites the populace to celebrate November in England with them at the Capilano Hall on November 01. Many rituals, holidays, feasts and foods were associated with this season. As the harvest was finished, livestock would be slaughtered and preparations were made for the coming winter. The old year was dying and people looked ahead.

The Season proper begins on October 31 with Hallowe'en. "Hallow" was the Old English word for "saint" so Hallowe'en meant Hallow's Eve - the eve of All Hallows Day (All Saints Day) - November 01. Ghosts, spirits, fortune telling, and fires lit to ward off evil spirits were common on October 31. Apple dishes and crumpets or pikelets were often served around the fire as were spiced cider and ales. This was the night when the dead walked - and if you drink enough of Eleanora's mulled cider - who knows what you might see!

November 01 is All Saints Day (All Hallows Day). Prayers were said for the dead and food was left out in the night for restless spirits who might be walking the earth. "Souling" was common on both All Saints and All Souls Day. People would go from door to door begging for soul cakes, apples and sweets in return for prayers and songs.

"A soul, a soul, a soul cake, Please good missus a soul cake,

An apple, a pear, a plum, or a cherry, Any good thing to make us merry."

### Traditional Rhyme

The best beggars and singers will be given free soul cake in the "spirit" of the season.

The last day of Hallowe'en was All Souls Day, November 02. These three days of Hallowe'en

have their origins in the ancient Celtic feast of the Dead - Samhain. As people went from house to house, they would drink spiced ale, eat soul cakes and remember the "ghouls and ghosties, long - leggitie beasties and things that go bump in the night." (anon.) Better stay inside the hall tonight-who knows what might lurk in the shadows!

Our journey continues on November 05 - Guy Fawkes Day - which commemorates the failure of the Gun powder Plot to blow up Parliament. This day is celebrated with many fire related customs: bonfires, fireworks and burning the "Guy" in effigy. We will not be burning our "Guy", but for the traditional penny, you can vent your spleen on this infamous traitor. Then try a piece of our "Tom Trot Toffee", the sweet that is traditionally served in Yorkshire on Guy Fawkes Day.

Our next stop is November 11, Martinmas Day. St Martin of Tours was a soldier before he became a monk. For some reason, he became the patron saint of beggars, drunkards and outcasts. Martinmas was a major feast day and time for Hiring Fairs. It was also the time when many animals were slaughtered and salted down for winter. A famous dish associated with this day was "Martinmas Beef". You can be sure it will be on the menu for the tavern night!

Our final feast for November is "St. Clements Day" - November 23. "Clementing" was a popular custom, especially among young people who would go from door to door, singing songs in return for apples or spice cakes. Bobbing for apples was a tradition and St Clements Day was also known as Bite Apple Day. "St Clements Tartlets" are a tasty treat and will be on the menu. Come bob for our apples and try our tarts. You can keep anything that you manage to bite except the barmaids.
