The next time someone tells you that the country is going downhill, that you can't trust the government and that people don't care about others anymore, you can show them this poem. It was written in England about 1450 A.D. and seems to indicate that some things never change.

On The Times

Now is Ingland all in fight; Muche people of consciens light; Many knightes and litel of might; Many lawes and litel right; Many actes of parlament And few kept with tru entent; Litel charite and fain to plese; Many a galant penylese; And many a wonderful disguising By unprudent and misavising; Grete countenanse and smalle wages; Many gentilemen and few pages; Wide gownes and large sleves; Wel besene and strong theves; Much bost of their clothes, But wel I wot they lake none othes.

As shown by this piece of early "Modern" English, one can quite easily read original works with just a little effort. The next poem was written about 100 years earlier, before Chaucer's "Canterbury Tales" and is a little more challenging. It is a good example of Middle English. Brissit brawnis anddd brokin banis, Strif, discord and wastie wanis, Crukit in eld, sin halt withall: Thir are the bewties of the fut-ball. Translation: Bruised muscles and broken bones Strife, discord and desolate homes Crooked in old age, then lame withall These are the beauties of foot-ball.

This leads us back to the theme of change - or lack thereof. I wonder if this poem was written tongue in cheek by a 14th century wife who was tired of her husband going out with the boys?
